Alabama Seal of Biliteracy: An Overview



National Adoption: The Seal of Biliteracy Across All 50 States



A Nationwide Commitment to Multilingualism

As of 2025-2026, every state in the U.S. has officially adopted the Seal of Biliteracy, recognizing graduates who have demonstrated proficiency in English and at least one other World Language.

■ All 50 States: Approved State Seal

The Alabama Seal Of Biliteracy Act of 2022



In April 2022, Governor Kay Ivey signed into law Alabama **ACT #2022-200**, which recognizes **graduates** who have demonstrated an indicated level of proficiency in **English** and at least one other **World Language**, including American Sign Language.



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What Is The Purpose Of The Seal Of Biliteracy?



Encourage Language Study

- To encourage students to study multiple languages.



Certify Proficiency

- To certify achievement of biliteracy at a minimum intermediate mid proficiency level.

Assessment for Employers



- To provide employees with a way to assess students' language proficiency and biliteracy skills.



Higher Education Recognition

- To help higher education institutions recognize and grant academic credit to applicants seeking admission.



To equip students with 21st-century skills.



To recognize and promote world languages instruction in Alabama Schools.



To affirm value of diversity, and honor multiple cultures of a community.



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What is the difference between being **bilingual** and being **biliterate**?

BILINGUAL



Ability to use two languages for communication, primarily through **speaking and listening**.

- **Focus:** Oral Proficiency
- **Context:** Conversational, Social
- **Domains:** Speaking, Listening

BILITERATE



Ability to use two languages proficiently for **reading, writing, speaking, and listening** at an academic level.

- **Focus:** Full Literacy & Proficiency
- **Context:** Academic, Professional
- **Domains:** Reading, Writing, Speaking, Listening

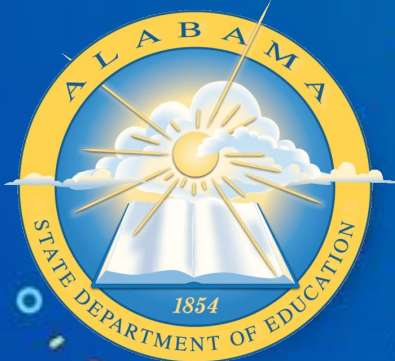

ACTFL Intermediate Mid Rigor

District must certify rigor equivalent to the **Intermediate Mid** level of proficiency, as defined by ACTFL.



Evaluate All Four Skills

Must evaluate **listening, speaking, reading, and writing** skills at **Intermediate Mid** level or higher.



Comparable to OPI/Interviews

Comparable in structure and rigor to the Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI) for tribal or less common languages.



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Must have ALSDE pre-approval.

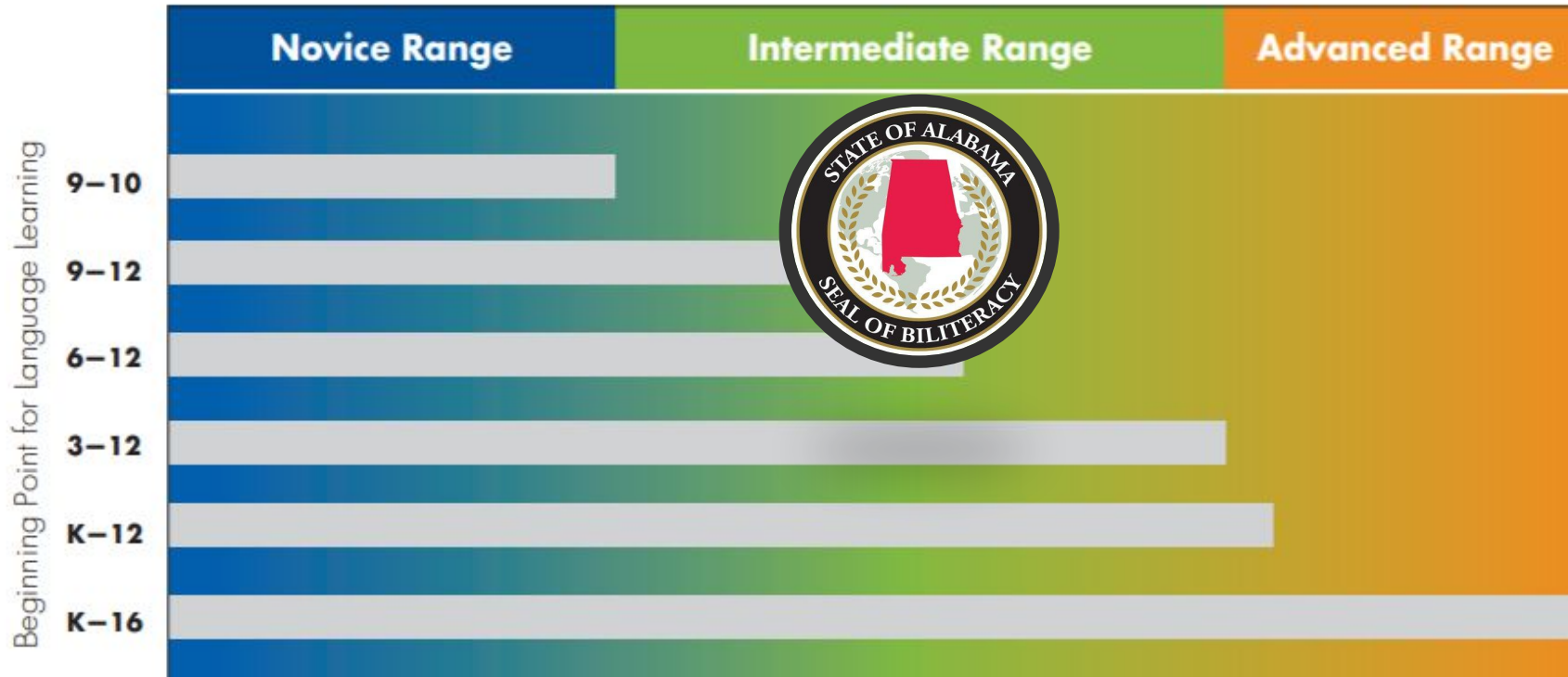

- Students will automatically be placed in the Spanish, German, or French 301 course (Intermediate High) and will be given 3 credits (for the 202 course) towards their Major or Minor in the language.
- These students are not required to take the language placement test.

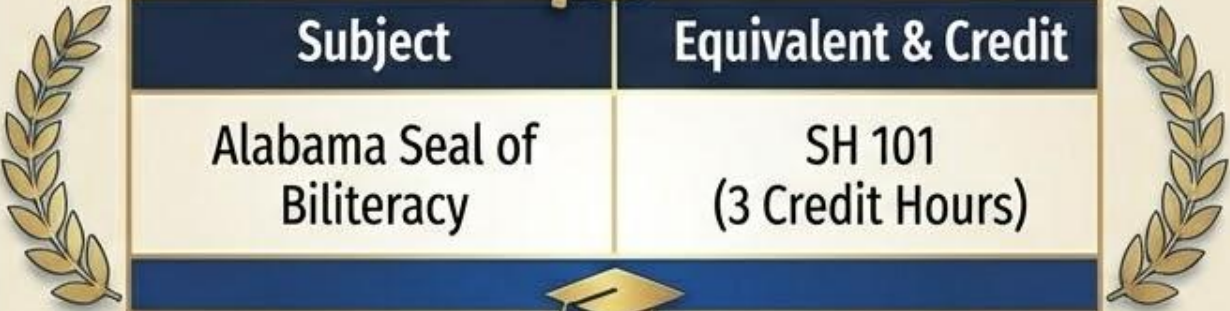

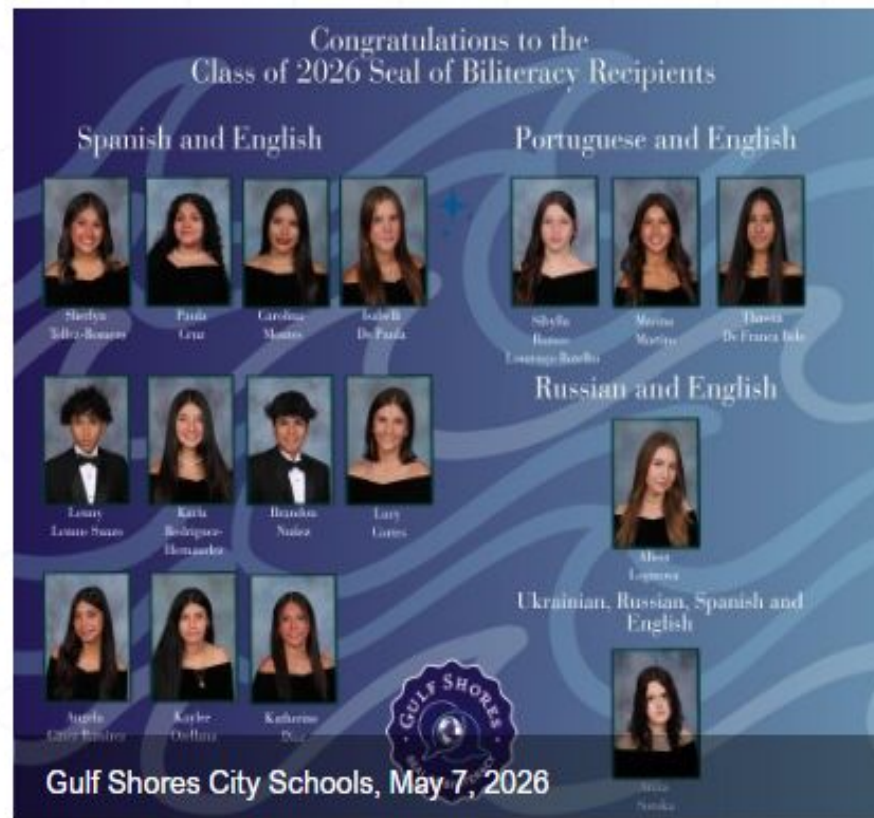
